
strengthening the social environment they grow up in.



CHALLENGING MIND READING

It's important to be aware of when we're mind reading and try to stop ourselves from doing it. We can challenge our thoughts and ask ourselves if there's any evidence to support what we're thinking. We can also remind ourselves that we can't really know what others are thinking unless they tell us.
